Dear Parents and Pupils

Welcome to St Joseph's Grammar/Scoil Iósaef, a school with a proud past and an exciting future.

St Joseph's Grammar School/ Scoil Iósaef is a Catholic school having been founded by the Daughters of the Cross in 1922. For over 100 years we have provided a nurturing and supportive learning environment in which all children are welcomed and are valued as individuals. We offer an outstanding educational experience for boys and girls from age 11 to 18 and all of our pupils progress into a wide variety of career pathways each year.

St Joseph's is unique in providing the only post-primary Irish Medium Stream in the mid-Ulster area and it is recognised as a thriving hub of linguistic excellence and cultural advancement. Launched in 2010, the Irish Medium Stream continues to go from strength to strength due, in no small part, to the rich and rewarding links we enjoy with a wide range of external Irish language bodies.

At St. Joseph's/Scoil Iósaef, we believe that every child is capable of greatness. Thus, we have the highest expectations of all our pupils and provide a curriculum that is broad and varied so that it meets the interests and ambitions of all learners. Our public exam results are consistently above the NI Grammar averages at both GCSE and A Level and these outcomes are a testament

to the hard work and diligence of our pupils and their teachers. Our dedicated staff know each pupil as an individual and work tirelessly to help them reach their full potential.

Of course, education should always be more than just the academics, important as these are. In St. Joseph's/Scoil Iósaef, it is our aim to give our young people every opportunity to acquire the skills and attributes that put them at the very front of the queue! We have a strong and growing presence in Ulster Colleges, an increasing number of Ulster and regional titles in netball, basketball, hurling and camogie and our swimmers, boxers and athletics competitors continue to make us proud of their achievements. We encourage our young people to participate in public speaking competitions, subject specific initiatives and charity drives so that they develop skills and capabilities that they can use in the real world. We have a long and well-earned reputation for our music and drama provision and our staff go above and beyond to offer clubs and societies that match the taste and interests of as many of our pupils as possible.

The school's sister charity, the Cairde Brogán Foundation, provides our pupils with opportunities to network with local and national businesses and organisations so that they are confident and well prepared for the world of work. Under the auspices of the Foundation, ten of our young people participate in the prestigious Ever to Excel

leadership programme each summer which is hosted by Boston College, USA. This is only one of a number of annual international trips which gives our pupils the chance to travel and experience other cultures and countries.

In St. Joseph's/Scoil Iósaef we place a real value on the caring and genial relationships between staff and pupils which are at the core of all the work that goes on in our school. All of our staff are guided by our Catholic ethos and the values entrusted to us by the Daughters of the Cross.

This year, we are preparing for a new stage in the story of St. Joseph's/Scoil Iósaef. Plans for a new school building and a 3G pitch are advancing towards planning application stage in early Spring 2026 and we look forward to gaining new state of the art provision which our pupils so richly deserve.

A history spanning over 100 years



1920

The Daughters of the Cross arrive in Donaghmore. They initially work to set up a hospital, but this venture is unsuccessful and attracts no more than twenty patients. Sr Mary Hyacinth Corrigan closes the entire hospital enterprise and attention turns to opening a school.



1935

The red brick building is opened for boarders by Cardinal McRory on 26th November 1935. The number of boarders is now fifty.



1950

The school continues to grow with just over 100 pupils. The first 'whole school photograph' is taken.

1922

The Sisters open a new school. There is a weight of evidence to suggest Mullygruen House was functioning as a school before its official opening. It is believed the first intake was of five girls, one of whom was Miss Susie Donnelly whose father donated a cow to the Sisters in 1920. Some of the first students are pictured with Cardinal O'Donnell, Dean Quinn and "Finn," the nuns' dog.




1941

Enrolment steadily increases as students who are evacuated from Belfast during World War II come to Donaghmore to board. There are now seventy students



1968

The new grey brick building is opened by Cardinal Conway.





1985

The first lay Principal, Mrs Helen McRory, oversees the difficult decision to end boarding. St Joseph's becomes a 'day school' only.



2007

Sadly the Sisters leave Donaghmore.



2016

There is significant capital investment on the site and a £4 million sports and drama complex is opened by then Education Minister, Peter Weir.



2023

There is further significant capital investment on the school site as a £1 million refurbishment of Mullygruen House begins along with a £4 million enhancement project to provide a new block of facilities.

2003

St. Joseph's Grammar School welcomes its first male students in two generations and officially becomes co-educational. It is worth noting that boys were also taught in the school during the 1920s.



2010

St. Joseph's Grammar School opens a pioneering Irish Medium Stream. Over the last fifteen years the IMS has grown significantly and proven to be exceptionally successful with students achieving examination results that far exceed the NI averages for similar students.



2022

St. Joseph's Grammar celebrates the centenary of its foundation by the Daughters of the Cross. The school now has an enrolment of 916.



Development of the School 2026 and Beyond

We are very fortunate that our school is situated on one of the gentle hills that overlooks the historic settlement of Donaghmore, a village with a long history dating back to the time of St Patrick. When in 1922, the Daughters of the Cross undertook to provide a school for local children in this area, the building they acquired was the old manor house of the Lyle family which you can still see today sitting proudly at the top of the school site as you approach from the Castlecaulfield Road. Along with the manor house came several acres of surrounding lands that the Sisters began to farm so that they could be as self-sufficient as possible. In spite of early challenges, the school began to thrive and "the Convent", as it was affectionately known, has expanded ever since.

In the decades after its foundation, government grants permitted the Sisters to develop and expand upon the original school premises so that by the late 1960s, the pupils and staff were able to move to what was then their brand new school building.

Today, the school estate consists of an eclectic mix of buildings from the 1830s, the 1930s and the 1960s. But more recently, we were delighted to take possession of our state-of-the-art sports hall and drama facilities, constructed under the Schools Enhancement Project in 2017.

As the new year beckons, we are awaiting the next phase of school development which is due to come to fruition after several years of planning and design. In 2025, the Department of Education acquired additional lands adjacent to the existing school site, adding an additional 6.5 acres to the school estate. Plans are about to be submitted to Mid-Ulster Council for approval for a new building which will include a new canteen, a library, a sixth form centre and several new general teaching classrooms. The new building will be located on the newly acquired lands and will allow the Department to progress further replacement of the 1960s buildings with more modern and appropriate accommodation for our children.

As well as the planned new building, we are also progressing the development of a 3G pitch which will be located at the back of the school site close to the sports hall.

There is a saying, "great oaks from little acorns grow" and that has certainly been the story of St Joseph's. We are excited about the future of our school and we would be delighted if you could be part of that journey with us.

Care and Welfare

We want all our students to grow into happy, confident, and aspirational young people who feel empowered to take up their place in the modern world.

Daily life in St. Joseph's / Scoil Íosaef is firmly focused on the care and welfare of our students. We aim to create a safe and secure learning environment and work hard to ensure that relationships for learning are characterised by mutual respect, openness, and trust. Our pastoral care structures aim to support students to effectively overcome barriers to learning and realise their potential.

The effectiveness of the personal development and preventative education curriculum is regularly reviewed to ensure it is flexible and responsive to the needs of all students. The pastoral team works collaboratively with outside agencies to support the care and welfare of all students.

The pastoral care aims in St. Joseph's / Scoil Íosaef are:

- To create and maintain a school culture where students feel safe, valued, known and respected;
- To inculcate within students a strong sense of their own dignity, identity and self-esteem, combined with a mutual respect for others;
- To proactively support students to develop strategies and change behaviours to maximise mental and physical health;
- To prepare students to become effective citizens in the local and global community.



The personal development and preventative education provision cuts across the curriculum but is also delivered through discrete weekly timetabled lessons which have been planned to ensure progression.

Students study a range of topics, including:

- Health and the whole person;
- Self-concept;
- Feelings and emotions;
- Morals, values and beliefs;
- Managing influences and making decisions;
- Managing change;
- Learning about learning;
- Relationships and Sex Education (RSE);
- Safety and managing risk;
- Drug awareness.

Safeguarding

We work hard to make sure that all our students understand that their concerns will be listened to, and appropriate action taken. St. Joseph's / Scoil Iósaef has a robust child protection and safeguarding policy which is in line with guidance issued by the Department of Education. The school engages in a regular process of self-evaluation to ensure that policy and procedure relating to child protection and safeguarding is working to protect students.





Learning Support

We have a dedicated Special Education Needs Coordinator (SENCo), Mr Niall Kelly who leads strategically to ensure that any child with an additional need, whether it be educational or medical, is supported and enabled to reach their full potential, academically and holistically.

As SENCo, Mr Kelly's role is:

- To actively lead and coordinate our Learning Support provision;
- To act as a valuable point of contact for students, parents, teaching staff, non-teaching staff and outside support services in relation to Learning Support for students of our school;
- To enable our students to meet their full potential by removing any barriers, or potential barriers, on their learning journey;
- To continually monitor and evaluate SEN provision; identifying and promoting best practice.

In terms of meeting all needs and more specifically, additional needs, here at St. Joseph's / Scoil Iósaef, we are proud of

our dedicated teaching staff. In addition, we have an excellent team of Learning Support Assistants who go above and beyond to support and help nurture the children in their care.

Mr Kelly explains that,

“It is an honour, not only to have been entrusted with this vital role in St. Joseph's / Scoil Iósaef, but also to work with such a dedicated and progressive staff who never give up and are fully committed to meeting the needs of the students in our school”.

You can be assured that the staff in St. Joseph's / Scoil Iósaef will leave no stone unturned to support your child to achieve their full potential.

Broad and balanced curriculum

As a high performing grammar school we believe in a culture of high aspiration.

The curriculum in St. Joseph's / Scoil Iósaeaf reflects the statutory curricular requirements. It provides students with access to a broad, balanced and flexible range of options which are matched well to their needs and interests and provides relevant pathways to appropriate destinations. Our curriculum offers the full range of traditional A Level subjects along with a variety of vocational qualifications. Our students continue to enjoy outstanding academic success in all subject areas including English, Science, Mathematics, Languages and the Humanities. Results in external examinations consistently show that our students out-perform the Northern Ireland Grammar Average in many subject areas. Data evidences that we remain one of the top performing grammar schools in Mid-Ulster.

The Curriculum Vice Principal has overall leadership responsibility for the curriculum. There is regular review of the curriculum, at all levels, to meet the needs and interests of the current cohort of students and enable them to realise their potential.

We work collaboratively with other schools in the Dungannon Area Learning Community (ALC) and the programmes available through the ALC are of high quality and demonstrate commitment to meeting the needs, abilities and aspirations of all students.

The end of Years 10 and 12 mark key transition points and the curriculum team works proactively with students and parents to offer the help and guidance needed to make effective and positive subject choices. Our Key Stage 4 and Post-16 curriculums are as flexible as possible and enable success.

The Sr Mary Brogán Academic Scholarship & The Helen McRory Scholarship

Principal, Mrs G. Donnelly, explained that the scholarships are a “practical expression of the legacy of Sr Mary Brogán who revelled in the successes of our students long after they left St. Joseph’s / Scoil Íosaef”.

The Sr Mary Brogán Academic Scholarship provides financial support to current and past students of St. Joseph’s Grammar School / Scoil Íosaef. In the 2022-2024 academic years, scholarships were offered to past students to support the payment of undergraduate or postgraduate degree

tuition fees. Niamh Brannigan received €4710 for her final year university fees in June 2024. As part of the scholarship programme these past students return to St. Joseph’s / Scoil Íosaef to deliver a range of programmes related to the personal and professional development of the current student body.

The Foundation was also extended to include “The Helen McRory Scholarship” which part-funded 10 Year 13 pupils’ travel and accommodation costs to attend a one week faith based camp in Boston College, Massachusetts. This experience has been invaluable for their own personal development and they have been generous in promoting this opportunity with other younger pupils so that they too gain the skills and values the programme brings.





Digital Skills

At St. Joseph's / Scoil Iósaef, we are committed to equipping students with essential digital skills to thrive in an increasingly digital world. Our comprehensive digital education programme spans all key stages, ensuring students develop a strong foundation in both practical and theoretical aspects of IT.

At Key Stage 3, students learn to use essential software such as Word, Excel, Access, Outlook, and PowerPoint. We cover fundamental IT theory topics including how computers work, main IT components, codebreaking, and binary and decimal conversion. Students also explore applications like Scratch, Adobe Cloud, Minecraft and learn to fully utilise Google Drive and One Drive both at home and in school.

At Key Stage 4, students can choose from specialised courses such as IT and Business, OCN ICT, Digital Technology, Multimedia, and Programming in C#. We emphasise the importance of key IT legislation such as the Data Protection Act, the Copyright Designs & Patents Act, and the Computer Misuse Act.

At Key Stage 5, students undertake a database project and delve into digital technology fundamentals, the software life cycle, programming, cloud computing, AI, and more. There is a continued focus on critical IT legislation to ensure students understand their legal responsibilities. Across the whole school, we encourage the integration of digital skills and digital

literacy in all subjects. E-Safety education is taught at all levels, with Sixth Form Digital Ambassadors collaborating with the E-Safety Coordinator and Pastoral Care Team to deliver online safety skills. We publish weekly E-Safety advice to parents and students as part of Web Wise Wednesday. An initiative set up to keep our E-Safety messages front and central all year round and not only on Safer Internet Day.

Students at all levels also have access to extra-curricular opportunities and careers events like workshops and presentations. We are in the third year of the Microsoft Dream Space Ambassador Award programme. This allows our senior students to learn new IT skills and impart this knowledge to our junior students. St. Joseph's / Scoil Iósaef has good connections within the IT industry and past pupils have returned to share their experiences of IT and the skills required in today's economy.

Key Stage 3:

Building Foundations

Careers education begins in Years 8–10 through Education for Employability lessons, introducing pupils to the world of work. In Year 10, students receive tailored guidance to make informed subject choices for Key Stage 4, including:

- Careers information from subject teachers and Heads of Departments.
- Attendance at a Year 10 Options Evening, where presentations are delivered by the Head of Careers, Mr P Corrigan, and the Head of Curriculum, Mrs O McCourt.

Our curriculum team works closely with the careers department to ensure each student has a personalised learning pathway that maximises their academic potential and career opportunities.

Key Stage 4:

Exploring Opportunities

Year 12 pupils engage in careers lessons designed to inform them of the various training, work, and study options available at the age of 16. Key activities include:

- Valuable work experience placements, offering insights into specific roles and workplaces.
- An A-Level Subject Choice Afternoon and Mini Careers Fair, where students interact with subject teachers, A-Level pupils, and local employers.

Guiding Futures, Shaping Success

Interactive Workshops

Each year group participates in engaging Young Enterprise Northern Ireland workshops. These interactive sessions explore workplace themes through practical activities, encouraging pupils to connect classroom learning with real-world applications.

Dedicated Careers Guidance

Our Careers Officer, Nuala Madden, provides tailored advice at key transition points in Year 10, Year 12, and Year 14, ensuring every pupil is fully supported in their educational and career choices.

Collaboration and Development

As a member of the Dungannon Area Learning Community, St Joseph's works closely with other schools to share resources and develop careers education. Careers staff also attend events organised by Mid-Ulster Council, ensuring they remain informed about local career trends and skills demands.

Promoting STEM

Promoting STEM for opportunities in these high-demand sectors, and career choices.

Sixth Form:

Tailoring Aspirations

A-Level students receive individualised guidance and a wealth of resources to support their career planning:

- One-to-one consultations with the Senior Management Team at the beginning of Years 13 and 14.
- Careers lessons and personalised advice in the dedicated Careers Suite.
- Presentations from Ulster University, Queen's University, Scottish and South of Ireland universities, South West College, and Student Finance Northern Ireland.
- Work experience placements in Term 3 of Year 13 to deepen their understanding of specific careers.

Year 14 pupils benefit from additional support, including presentations on Foundation Degrees, Higher-Level Apprenticeships, and Life at University training sessions. These sessions prepare students for the challenges of higher education, offering practical advice on managing academic and personal responsibilities.

My passion for engineering began when I studied Engineering and Technology at GCSE. This subject not only sparked my interest but also laid the foundation for my future career. The Careers Department and the Engineering and Technology Department at St. Joseph's played a vital role in nurturing this interest by providing tailored one-on-one guidance, workshops, and opportunities for work experience. Their focus on future planning ensured I felt supported and confident in making informed decisions about my career path.

For students with specific industry interests like mine, the school created pathways to success by introducing us to local employers and highlighting apprenticeship opportunities that matched our strengths and aspirations.

In Year 13, I had the opportunity to undertake work experience at Mallaghan Engineering. From the moment I stepped through their doors, I knew this was where I wanted to build my career.

Through the school, I was also introduced to the MEGA apprenticeship programme. MEGA provided workshops and valuable insights into the different levels of apprenticeship opportunities available, as well as information about the numerous local companies involved. I was determined to secure a degree apprenticeship, which required applications to both MEGA and Ulster University, alongside completing my UCAS form to keep my options open.

Securing a degree apprenticeship in engineering is highly competitive, and the interview period coincides with exam season, making it an intense



time. St. Joseph's / Scoil Iósaef prepared me well for this challenge by offering interview preparation sessions, mock interviews, and classes on interview techniques. These proved invaluable when I faced interviews with industry professionals.

Today, I am proud to be a degree apprentice at Mallaghan Engineering. The skills I developed at St. Joseph's / Scoil Iósaef—such as teamwork, problem-solving, and attention to detail—have been essential in my fast-paced, hands-on role. I feel privileged to work for a respected local company, learn from experienced professionals, and continuously develop my technical abilities while pursuing my studies at Ulster University.



Art, Music and Drama

In St. Joseph's Grammar School / Scoil Iósaef, we understand the value of participating in the creative arts.

With global employers crying out for graduates with skills that meet the needs of the 21st-century economy – from innovation to critical thinking and adaptability – we consciously place a high value on creativity and are constantly looking for exciting and engaging ways to nurture these skills in our students. In St. Joseph's / Scoil Iósaef we believe that the arts can act as a key, unlocking many of the skills that inspire children to engage with their studies and love learning.

Art, music and drama are a vital and enriching part of education at St. Joseph's / Scoil Iósaef. They allow the students to develop alternative approaches and strategies for problem-solving and thinking. Even if students do not follow on to a creative career, they take with them the ability and skills to think differently and numerous studies have shown that employers value individuals with fresh viewpoints who can find alternative means to solutions.

Drama

In 2016, our state-of-the-art Drama Suite was opened as part of a £4 million capital investment project, providing our students with a first-class facility equipped with the latest technology. Students at Key Stage 3 have Drama once per week, with the curriculum designed to inspire creativity, self-expression, and critical thinking.

The focus of Key Stage 3 Drama is underpinned by William Shakespeare's mantra, "All the world's a stage." We believe that every student should have the opportunity to express themselves fully and freely. In Year 8, students develop fundamental dramatic skills such as facial expression and body language. In Year 9, the curriculum explores a range of playwrights from Willy Russell to Brian Friel, while also engaging students in creating and analysing short films using our Green Screen. Year 10 builds on these skills, with students analysing scripts and developing detailed character profiles in preparation for GCSE. We are delighted to now offer GCSE Drama, allowing students to deepen their understanding of performance, theatre theory and practical skills.

Dramatic play is essential for children's learning, particularly in fostering empathy and self-control. Students learn to empathise by viewing the world from different perspectives; those of peers, adults and characters in stories, developing crucial social and emotional skills that underpin academic success and personal growth. Research in educational theory consistently shows that engagement in Drama enhances cognitive development, communication skills and creativity, making it a vital part of a balanced curriculum.

Many of our students showcase their talents on stage at Bardic, CRAIC and Armagh Market Place, demonstrating the vibrancy of our performing arts culture. Some students have gone on to develop careers in Drama and you will see them on Television series such as Blue Lights and Derry Girls. Our after-school Drama Club is very popular, and a recent highlight was our sellout performance of Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat in October 2022, showcasing the talent and dedication of our students.

Art and Design

Create. Innovate. Inspire.

Art and Design at our school is about unlocking potential and inspiring creativity. From the moment students join us in Year 8, they embark on an exciting journey of self-expression and discovery. They learn to think independently, experiment boldly, and develop the skills that will shape their future.

Our curriculum builds strong foundations in artistic techniques while encouraging imagination and innovation. At GCSE and A Level, students refine their craft and explore personal ideas, preparing for opportunities in the thriving creative industries - one of the fastest-growing sectors in the UK and Ireland.

Learning does not stop at the classroom door. Students work alongside professional artists and craftspeople in dynamic workshops, gaining real-world insights. They visit galleries, attend artist lectures, and travel abroad to experience world-class art and architecture - broadening horizons and sparking inspiration.

Art and Design is not just a subject; it is a gateway to creativity, confidence, and limitless possibilities.



Music

The Music Department plays an active role in the life of St. Joseph's / Scoil Iósaef, not only providing an excellent base knowledge of Music to all students but giving the opportunity to excel in musical development and performance outside the classroom. Along with providing music for all school events our choir and instrumental groups have performed with Peter Corry, Liam Lawton, Malachi Cush and for the Lady Mary Peters Foundation. The rich history of music in our school has developed into a vibrant and dynamic expression of talent and ability recognised far beyond the confines of St. Joseph's / Scoil Iósaef.



Faith development

Participating in prayer, sacraments, and Mass are central aspects of life at St. Joseph's Grammar.

Each month, we focus on one of our core values: faith, community, aspiration, kindness, hope, integrity, and service, embedding these principles into all aspects of school life. Our school prayer is used as the Morning Prayer in Form Class each day, providing a reflective start to our students' mornings. Each week, classes attend Mass in the local church, fostering a strong connection with the parish community. Throughout the year, we celebrate feast days, with assemblies and special services dedicated to these occasions.

Our liturgical calendar is rich with celebrations. During Lent, we hold reflective assemblies and charity events. The entire school community take part in daily challenges during Lent, focusing on the virtues of truth, love and justice.

Advent brings a spirit of preparation, culminating in a beautiful Christmas Carol Service before the end of term. In February, we celebrate Grandparents' Day by making St. Brigid's Crosses with our Year 8 classes, honouring tradition and family values. Each year we have a remembrance service in the nun's graveyard, a welcome mass and celebration for our new year 8s and a mass on the feast of our Patron, St. Joseph the worker. These events provide opportunities for spiritual growth and collective worship, enriching the faith of students and staff alike.

FAITH IN ACTION

At St. Joseph's Grammar, our students are encouraged to live out their faith through charitable and voluntary work within the school, at home, in the community, and beyond.

Many of our students extend their charitable efforts beyond school, volunteering in their personal time. Sport

At St. Joseph's / Scoil Íosaef, we take immense pride in our rich sporting tradition, which fosters teamwork, resilience, and excellence.

Our comprehensive PE curriculum is complemented by a dynamic extra-curricular programme that includes Gaelic football, hurling, camogie, netball, athletics, and cross-country running. Swimming, Handball and Show Jumping are also represented by students individually. We are deeply committed to promoting participation at all levels, offering students opportunities to compete in Ulster and All-Ireland competitions.

Students benefit from state-of-the-art facilities, including a full-size sports hall, an outdoor pitch, and a modern fitness suite, providing the ideal environment to develop their sporting skills. With the support of our dedicated PE staff, along with strong partnerships with local clubs and parents, we create an inclusive and nurturing atmosphere for all our athletes. From grassroots participation to elite success, St. Joseph's continues to build a lasting legacy of sporting achievement.



BOYS GAA

Gaelic football is a cornerstone of sporting life at St Joseph's, with our teams consistently excelling in Ulster Colleges' competitions. Over the past three years, the school has competed in the prestigious MacRory Cup, reaching the semi-finals in our first year and progressing to the knockout stages again this season. This is a remarkable achievement that reflects the depth of talent within the squad.

A major highlight came in 2023 when St Joseph's captured the MacLarnon Cup, followed by an outstanding victory in the All-Ireland series, marking a proud moment in the school's sporting history.

Individual success is equally strong. Former students Joey Clarke and Noah Grimes have been recognised with QUB Future Stars awards, while many others continue to represent their counties at both minor and senior levels.

Our pathway remains vibrant at junior level, with our Year 10 boys securing the Loch an Iúir Shield for 2024/2025, demonstrating the ongoing growth and strength of boys' Gaelic games within the school.

LGFA

Our senior ladies' football team competes in the Ulster B Colleges competition and reached the semi-final stage last year, narrowly missing out on a place in the final. At junior level, our Under-14 squad enjoyed their most successful season to date, capturing the Ulster B Colleges title with an impressive victory over St Ciaran's, Ballygawley.

Individual honours have also highlighted the strength of ladies' football within the

school. Isabella Grimes earned a prestigious Ulster Schools' All-Star award for 2024/2025, recognising her outstanding performances. In addition, both Hannah Donnelly and Cathy Ann McRory have recently been selected as Queen's Future All Stars and will receive their awards in April 2026. This continued success reflects the commitment, skill and growing profile of LGFA within St Joseph's.

HURLING & CAMOGIE

Following the recent success of our first Ulster Schools' All-Star in hurling, awarded to Leo Hughes in 2024 to 2025, our Under-13.5 hurlers enjoyed a breakthrough season by capturing the Corn Setanta title.

Our camogie programme continues to flourish. With Ulster Schools' All-Star and Future Star awards in 2022 and 2024 for Aoife Quinn and Kaitlin Gallagher, the standard of performance has remained exceptionally high. Our Under-16 teams have reached the Ulster Final in each of the past three years, narrowly missing out on the title on every occasion.

Success at junior level has been equally impressive. Our Under-14 camogs secured their first Ulster Schools' title with a strong win over Loreto Cavan at Scotstown, a memorable achievement and a sign of many more titles to come. Further individual recognition came with Hollie Croucher, who earned her first Ulster Schools' All-Star. This is only the school's third camogie All-Star and she will receive the award in April 2026.

NETBALL

Netball at St Joseph's has flourished in recent years, with our teams achieving outstanding success at both regional and national levels. In 2024, our minor team captured the Northern Ireland Division One League title, while our intermediate team continued their strong run of form by winning the Intermediate Bowl at the NNI Finals in Lisburn Racquets, building on their 2023 achievements.

A proud moment for the school came when the team was formally recognised by Mid Ulster District Council at the awards night in the Hill of O'Neill and Ranfurly House. This acknowledgement reflects the dedication, teamwork and growing prominence of netball within St Joseph's.

The sport continues to thrive, with many of our players progressing into Northern Ireland regional development squads, a testament to the depth of talent and the positive, ambitious netball culture within the school.

BASKETBALL

ATHLETICS & CROSS-COUNTRY RUNNING

Athletics and cross-country continue to bring significant acclaim to St Joseph's, with students regularly excelling at district, Ulster and All-Ireland levels. Most recently, Laura Quinn is placed third in the district championships, progressed through to Ulsters, and represented the school at the All-Ireland Championships - a fantastic achievement for a young athlete.

SWIMMING

Swimming success has also been prominent. Eimear O'Neill was one of five finalists for the Mid Ulster Young Sportsperson of the Year award. This incredible recognition follows her outstanding performance at the Irish National Swimming Age Group Championships in Dublin last July. Eimear qualified for multiple events, competed in five, and achieved an amazing five national medals. Sophia Kostanetska produced an outstanding performance at the Swim Ulster Primary Schools Cup and Championships in Bangor, securing first place in both the 50m breaststroke and the 100m individual medley.


